

Faith is... Openness to God's Grace

Dear Friend,

I was in a chocolate store in Florida some weeks ago, hunting down a chocolate truffle for that late afternoon bike ride energy I needed. Protein, you know. Two little boys at the other end of the counter had their hearts set on some chocolate-covered gummy bears, heaped on a tray beneath the glass. The clerk put a scoop of these rubbery things on the scale, only to find that the digital readout bore no resemblance to the change in the kids' hands. She removed half the pile with her latex glove. That wasn't enough. It was still

> too expensive for the 50 cents between them. You can imagine the look of disappointment on the faces of these boys when she finally handed them their meager plastic bag. How were they supposed to know what a "price per pound" sign meant?

In a world where nearly everything is weighed, measured, or calculated, it's refreshing to discover that faith has nothing to do with any of these things. It is beyond all measurement. Either you have

it or you don't. When the disciples were trying to measure their faith one day—"Lord increase our faith"—Jesus just turned and told them they had better get acquainted with a tiny mustard seed and start comprehending its relationship to faith.

Faith is not a feeling that can be measured. It's openness to the extravagance of God's grace; it's a deep personal trust that God knows what God is doing. When Jesus says that God gives the Spirit away without measure (John 3:34), he means it. God doesn't dole out the Spirit in dribs and drabs. No, the grace of the Spirit flows and flows beyond all capacity to measure. Faith becomes our incalculable response to this divine generosity.

Faith is... Active

aith.

I recently learned this definition of faith: It is not an idle, inactive grace, but shows itself by producing in us love to God and our neighbor. How cool is that!

I immediately thought of my Grandma Babo—that wasn't her real name, but that's what we called her. A tiny woman with a glorious wreath of pure white hair is how I remember her. She always had lemon drops in her dresser drawer, she braided my hair ever so gently, and she had an oil cloth on her table. She loved flowers too, especially Lily of the Valley and Lilacs.

My mother was one of her eight children raised during the Great Depression. It was an awful time. The cow died because there was no food to give her, my

mother's baby brother died in the flu epidemic, supper was often potatoes followed by more potatoes, and each year only one of the eight kids could go to the church picnic because the entry fee was a nickel.

But, there never was a time when a tramp (as they were called then) or a beggar was turned away from the kitchen

door—even if all grandma had was potatoes or bread, the tramps, those hungry, unemployed folks of the depression, never left without something. I was told that grandma would heap a plate as full as she could, and carry it to them with a smile. As she scraped the butter paper clean and peeled see-through skin off those potatoes, my grandma prayed fully trusting that God would take care of her children.

Grandma had to go to work. She spent the early part of every day at the bakery baking bread and pie, and then she "took in wash," to try and make ends meet. Yet my mother and her siblings never heard a sigh, a sob, or a complaint—grandma's thoughts were for her neighbor who was ill, and for the neighbor who didn't go to church.

I have my grandmother's Bible. It's so worn I hardly dare turn the pages, but in that precious and holy book is my name written in her hand. The names of all her children and grandchildren are there. Hers was not an idle faith. Her example taught those eight children about God and about loving your neighbor.
