

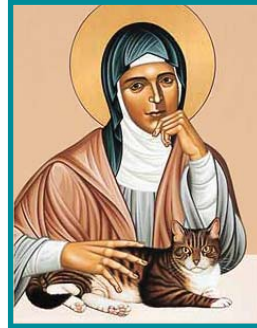

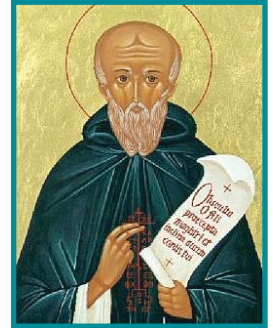
Maximilian Kolbe

c.480 - c.547

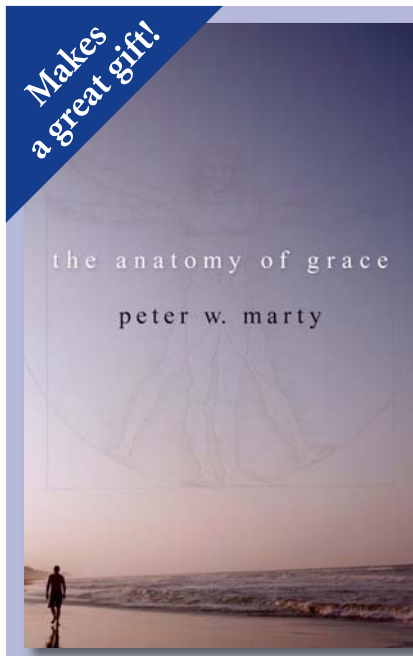

A Christmas Glossary

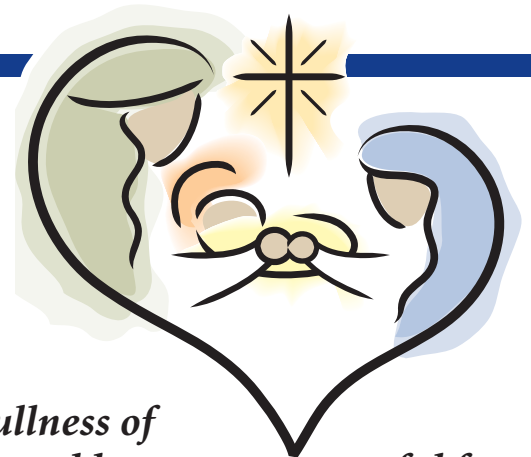

Well, I guess it’s the thought that counts.”

There must have been some sort of Toys “R” Us establishment that the magi could have shopped at had they been more considerate of the baby’s age.
